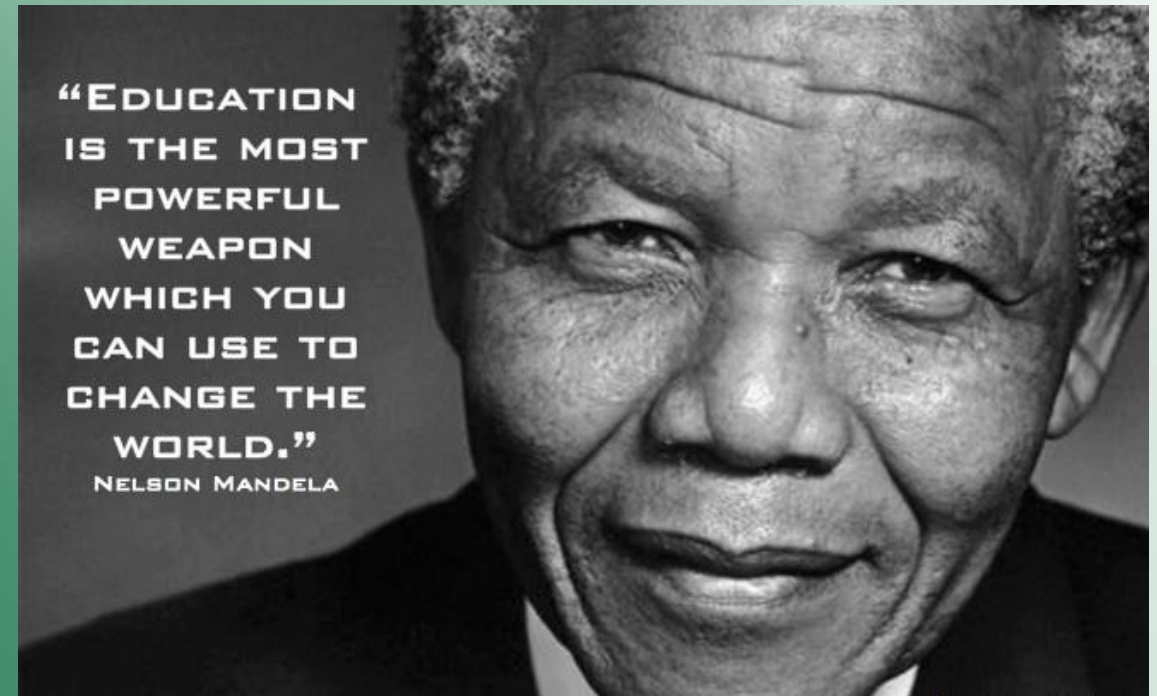

- Promote the WVA Global Online Education Portal
- Support consistent core competencies for all entry level veterinary medical education programs
- Expand role of WVA recognition of accredited VEEs for core competencies and outcome assessments for all graduating veterinarians around the world
- WVA/MSD education scholarships for veterinary students across 4 geographic regions (Asia, Africa, MENA & Latin America)





Two Important Initiatives

- The WVA Global Online Education Portal - the most comprehensive central pool of free online Veterinary Continuing Education in the world.
- A Global Conference on Quality Assurance in Veterinary Education – World Veterinary Congress in Korea in August 2017





WVA Global Online Education Portal

- E-learning is the future
- Provides a free distribution platform for sharing of educational content by educators with free technical support
- Customized portals available for association CE
- Individuals and VEEs have access to quality content
- Opportunity for revenue, if desired





Education For Developing Nations

- Educational content for developing nations ...can you help??
- Certificate for donated free education Ex:
- Donated courses for \$10 and studied by 5,000 learners earns a certificate of recognition for a \$50,000 donation for education.
- A digital certificate for website
- Increased Payment Percentage of 5% for education to learners in developed nations





Global Conference on Quality Assurance in Veterinary Education

- World Veterinary Congress, Incheon, Korea – August 27-31, 2017
- WVA “recognition” of accredited VEEs for core competencies with outcome assessments for all graduating veterinarians around the world
- WVA must have trust in the accrediting body process that evaluates the veterinary medical programs

- Higher employment opportunities





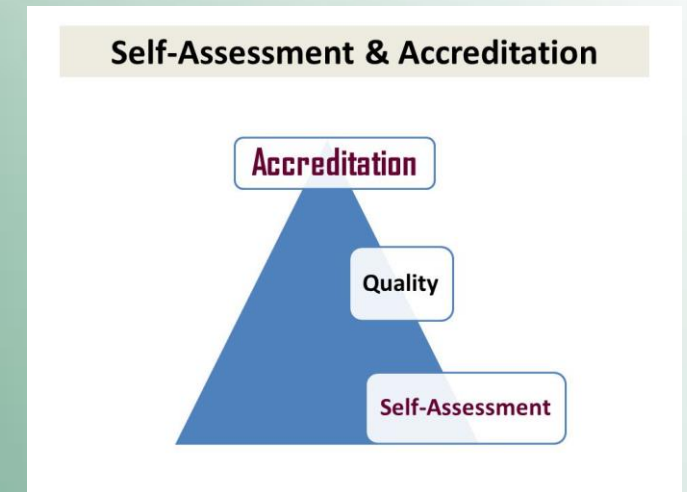

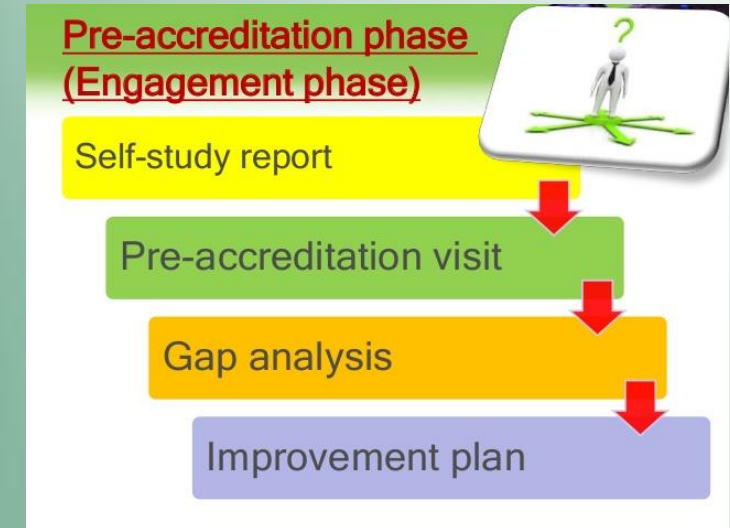
